The top three fields of study for full-time doctoral enrolments in 2012 were:

Physical and Life Sciences, and Technologies (21% of all doctoral enrolments);

Social and Behavioural Sciences, and Law (21% of all doctoral enrolments);

Architecture, Engineering and Related Technologies (19% of all doctoral enrolments).

More than 50% of graduate students have been female in Canada since 1997

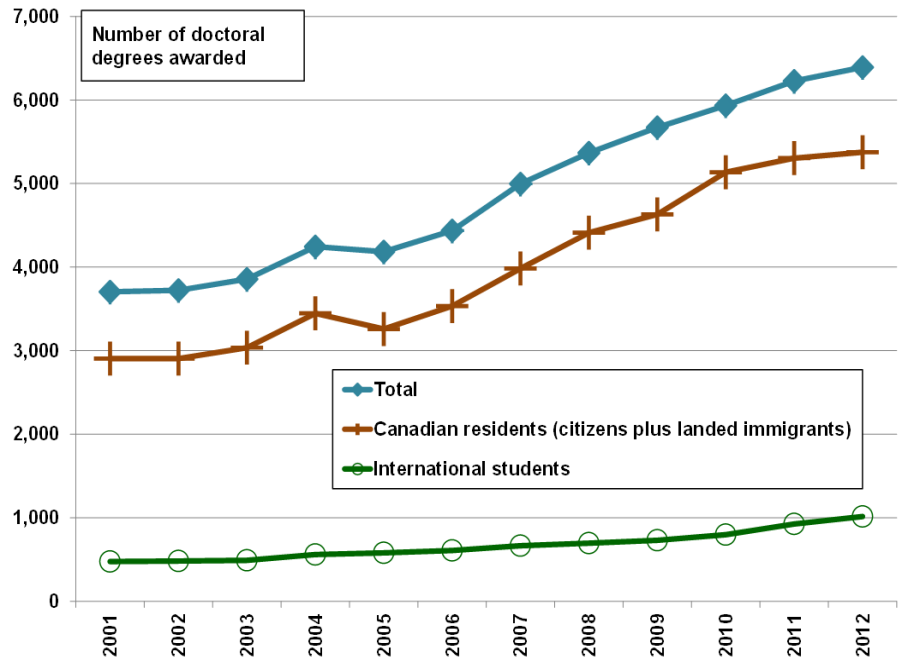
39% of full-time Master's enrolments were in Ontario, 28% were in Quebec.

39% of full-time doctoral enrolments were in Ontario and 30% of full-time doctoral enrolments were in Quebec.

Since 2007, the absolute number of international enrolments in full-time Master's programs has increased by over 8,000. Enrolments by Canadian citizens and permanent residents increased by 6,426 students.



Since 2007, the absolute number of international students in full-time doctoral programs increased by almost 5,700. Full-time doctoral enrolments among by Canadian citizens and permanent residents increased by 3,693 students.
